A LETTER FROM OUR PARISH PRIEST, FR PETER EDWARDS

Dear brothers and sisters

As many of you will have seen from the television news and newspapers, recent weeks have seen votes in the House of Commons on the difficult ethical issues of abortion and euthanasia in the UK. If enacted, these bills would effectively mean that the termination of a pregnancy would be legal up to full-term (instead of up to 24 weeks gestation at present), and euthanasia of terminally-ill persons would be allowed in certain circumstances through assisted suicide –doctors would have to diagnose that lifeexpectancy would be no more than six months.

There is no doubt that these are difficult ethical areas, about which people may well have strongly held views – and as ever, as Christians we should extend our love and charity to all those involved in making such decisions, and towards those who may hold views with which we profoundly disagree.

My own view in these matters concurs with the traditional teaching of the Church, that life is sacred from the moment of conception to that of natural death. Human beings are made in God's image, each of us is infinitely precious in God's eyes, and intended for an eternal destiny. Thus the Christian attitude towards human life must be one of reverence, and our worth to God implies the duty of cherishing, protecting, and preserving all human life.

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In the weeks since the Third Reading of the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill in the House of Commons, several Bishops of the Church of England have expressed their concern. In a public letter, +Michael (Bath & Wells, the CofE's deputy lead bishop on the issues of health and social care) warns that the safeguards build into the bill are not strong enough, voicing concerns about the potential for vulnerable people to be coerced or pressurised into seeking assisted suicide. He believes that improved access to palliative care, including hospices, should be provided.

+Sarah (London, a former Chief Nursing Officer for England and the lead bishop in this area) believes that the Bill's proposals are "unworkable and unsafe and pose a risk to the most vulnerable people in our society. If enacted, this legislation would come into force amid serious shortfalls in adult social care, a post code lottery in palliative care and well documented pressures on the NHS, multiplying the potential risks to the most vulnerable. It does not prevent terminally ill people who perceive themselves to be a burden to their families and friends from choosing 'assisted dying.' And it would mean that we became a society where the state fully funds a service for terminally ill people to end their own lives but shockingly only funds around one third of palliative care. Every person is of immeasurable and irreducible value, and should be able to access the care and support that they need – a principle that I know is shared by those all faiths and none. We must oppose a law that puts the vulnerable at risk and instead work to improve funding and access to desperately needed palliative care services."

And similarly, +Paul (Oswestry) has pointed out that should the Bill become law, "its passing will forever change the medical profession as well as society's attitudes to the ill and vulnerable. It will contribute to the Culture of Death, not the Culture of Life for which the Church labours and longs."

The point that the bishops make about palliative and hospice care is an area that I am personally extremely concerned about—a result of such legislation being passed would, I believe, eventually lead to the closure of all hospices, and palliative care being restricted only to those who could afford it privately since it would be cheaper on a purely cost basis to encourage the terminally ill to seek premature death.

Please join me in praying for our Members of Parliament and all those involved in making decisions as they consider these issues further, and as they seek to work for the wellbeing of all – particularly the most vulnerable – in our society.





SOME CHARITY FOR OTHERS IN JULY AND AUGUST

ST JOHN'S CHURCH gives away 10% of its general income at the end of each year to support 12 charities. Each month we remember the work of one of these charities. Please support these good causes.

Charity for July: THE MISSION TO SEAFARERS

This mission supports Seafarers in over 260 ports in 71 Countries around the world. It operates a global network of Chaplains and volunteers who offer a Christian welcome, practical and financial support, access to legal advice, and family liaison services. The Seafarers Centres offer "home away from home", providing a range of facilities including telephone and email services, enabling seafarers to contact their loved ones. The Centres also provide an opportunity for relaxation away from their ship, and the chance to seek counselling and spiritual support. St John's continues to help this vital work which helps the Seafarers in their sometimes lonely and dangerous lives.

Charity for August: WIZZIBUG WHEELCHAIRS FOR KIDS

There is often no funding for powered wheelchairs for children under five years old, "DESIGNABILITY", only with donations, make and provide Wizzibug wheelchairs free to children who will benefit. Each wheelchair is designed to a child's 'request,' (the wheelchair could resemble a car, ladybird etc.) and is made at the RUH. When a child grows out of the wheelchair it is returned for reuse, and the child goes on to the next size.

ST MARY'S CHARITIES FOR JULY AND AUGUST 2025

ST MARY'S CHURCH makes weekly collections during the Sunday services using the "Alms" envelopes which are given away to a different charity each month. **In July** we will be supporting the **Genesis Trust** which supports homeless and vulnerable people in the Bath area. It provides help to support people with their immediate needs and then journeys with them as they gain confidence, learn new skills and make choices to restore and rebuild their lives. The charity has recently been granted planning permission for the refurbishment of their Gateway Centre which had to close last summer due to severe flooding.

In August all weekly collections will go to **Bath Welcomes Refugees** except for the first Sunday of the month, August 3rd when we will be supporting the **Mission to Seafarers** as Sea Sunday this year fell on 12th July. The Mission provides help and support to the 1.89 million crewmen and women who face danger every day to keep our global economy afloat. Day and night, 365 days a year, Port Chaplains are available to give that support which is tailored to their individual needs. Over 200 ports provide a range of welfare work from ship visiting and Christian services to running Seafarers' Centres.

Bath Welcomes Refugees provides a variety of resources and some free services to refugees and their families. The charity has over 200 volunteers supporting children and adults, refugees and asylum seekers, from Syria, Afghanistan, Ukraine and other countries. Their mission is to harness the power of local relationships and the good will of the Bath people to help refugees and asylum seekers to feel welcome, access resources and find a new home and community. Support can range from providing a few items of furniture to assisting in every aspect of resettlement, home building and job finding.

Listening to young people

Later this month I shall be joining young people from around our diocese on a visit to the Taizé community in France. Taizé offers the opportunity to take a step back from daily life, meet people from around the world, join in a week of prayer, worship and Bible teaching, and reflect on our life of faith. In churches we often speak about God. To visit Taizé is to have a big encounter with God.

This will be the third time I have helped lead a Bath and Wells group on this pilgrimage. Some of our young people will be making a return visit, others attending for the first time. I am looking forward to seeing all they gain from the experience and to simply spending time listening to them and all they have to say.

The opportunity to spend an extended time listening to young people is an utter privilege. While more young people are showing an interest in faith, the Church of England is undeniably still dominated by the older generations. Whenever I can, I value immensely the chance to listen to young people – of their hopes and dreams, their fears and perspectives, their insights and understanding.

Such listening is essential if young people are to be fully part of the life of our Church. It's vital if we are to continue to see the shoots of growth that are happening across our diocese and the wider church.

We're pursuing this challenge of listening to young people in lots of different ways. It doesn't just happen at Taizé! Our Young Leaders Hub is one arena. Elsewhere we are looking at how young people can play their full part within the life of our diocesan decision-making bodies and in the national church too. I urge you to do the same where you are.

'Nothing about us without us' is a challenge that's sometimes extended when discussing how young people can participate fully wherever they find themselves. What an aim and a prize this would be for us all to pursue.

Lavender

The three lavender bushes in St Mary's Garden are now flowering but what do you associate with lavender? I expect many of us remember our mothers and grandmothers really rating Yardley's Lavendar water and talcum powder *(I remember being delighted when my grandmother offered me a spray when I was going somewhere special)* but here is a little more about these fascinating plants.



Lavandula is one of the known species of perennial flowering plants in the sage family, *Lamiaceae*. It is native to the Old World found, primarily, across the drier, warmer regions of the Mediterranean. Lavenders are popular, aromatic, drought-tolerant garden plants, easy to grow and associate well with other shrubs and perennial plants

However, as well as being pleasing to the eye, lavender is grown commercially for the production of its essential oil, which comes from the distillation of the flower spikes of certain lavender species This oil has cosmetic uses, and many people believe it has medicinal qualities, including helping with mood, anxiety, and depression; it is important to remember however that Lavender essential oil, in contrast to the plant form, is toxic when swallowed.

Lavendar spikes are pretty, delicate flowers which do perfume the air so, as they are now in full bloom, it was easy to relate to one of Father Antony's examples on Trinity Sunday – a root (Father), a stem (Son), a flower to fill the air (Spirit).




