A LETTER FROM OUR PARISH PRIEST, FR PETER EDWARDS

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Highly Exalted by God: The Resurrection of Jesus

I write this short article as we are about to set out to journey with Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday when we will stand with the crowds who welcomed him into the Holy City; then through the days of teaching and preparation of Monday to Wednesday of Holy Week; then to the Sacred Triduum itself when we will reenact the drama and the emotions of the Last Supper on Thursday evening, the Passion and Death of the Lord on Friday afternoon, and the first celebrations of the Resurrection at 8pm on Holy Saturday evening and the joyful proclamation of the defeat of death on Easter morning. Times and venues of the principal services of these days are shown on p.4 of this magazine.

By the time we reach the month of April, therefore, we will be into the season of seasons, Eastertide, when we should proclaim with confidence and joy that Jesus is risen from the dead! The Lord of heaven and earth, the one who has burst from the tomb, is alive and has all power and authority! This is the unceasing proclamation of the church, the heart of the apostles' preaching from the day of Pentecost, and the model for the church throughout all history – right up to our own day. We might say that the entire church is made up of those who know and proclaim the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Jesus is the source of our hope and our joy. We hold his words of life out to the world to save it from the darkness of sin, aimlessness and despair. We show to that world our faith – that work of God in us by which we grasp something of the truth of the risen Lord. He loved us and gave himself to the cross for us so that we might rejoice in salvation and have personal knowledge of the one who saved us. This is indeed our hope. During this Easter season the church asks us to meditate on the reality of Jesus' resurrection. What does it mean that the Son of God died and rose to new life? How are we to really understand his death as a sacrifice which the Father accepts?

To really grasp the light of the glory of Jesus' resurrection, we need the light of the Holy Spirit, elevating our hearts and minds to the glory of heaven itself. We ask the Holy Spirit to strengthen our hearts in the assurance of the Father's love as it is shown on the face of the risen Lord Jesus. Now, in the glory of his transformed humanity, Jesus has received the Holy Spirit from his Father and continues to pour out this Spirit on all men and women. He is truly present among us, particularly in the Eucharist, when we proclaim his death until he comes again.

Such is the unspeakable glory of our risen Lord. We can, right now, share in this glory, because the same power which God the Father exerted by raising Jesus from the dead is at work in us who believe. As we seek to grasp the word of God and lift our hearts and minds to the Lord in prayer, as we strive to obey his word and reverence his creation, we will come to know more assuredly that we are dead to sin; our real lives lie hidden with Christ in God. We will begin to know and experience that same new humanity that now belongs to Jesus, it is a life that is free from darkness and fear.

With all prayers and best wishes for a truly joyful Easter,

Kitchen refurbishment

The long-awaited refurbishment of the kitchen at St Mary's Church Hall is expected to take place between Monday 15th and Friday 26th April—to include new flooring and kitchen cupboards and drawer units.

This means that kitchen facilities in the Hall will be reduced during this period

Icon of the Resurrection



Orthodox icons of the Resurrection usually portray the defeat of the powers of Hell as the risen Christ rises from a shattered tomb—I am sure that our friends from the Orthodox parish of St John of Kronstadt (who worship at St John's church) would welcome interest in their own icons as objects of devotion which enable us to enter more deeply into the mysteries of our salvation through our sight and contemplation

Key features of such images often include:

- Christ's robe is flowing upward, which symbolizes his rising from Hades having saved those who have died in the flesh
- The golden bars by his feet are the gates of Hades, which he has broken and torn apart; the chained, skeletal figure beneath the gates represent death that has been defeated and bound by Christ's resurrection
- The two figures whom Christ is pulling from tombs are Adam and Eve; this symbolizes his victory which redeems all mankind, even back to the beginning. It also foreshadows the general resurrection of the body before the Final Judgment
- To the left, we see the Old Testament figures of David and Solomon, and (closest to Jesus), John the Baptist, Jesus' forerunner in both life and death
- The figures on the right vary from icon to icon, but usually represent Old Testament prophets and saints such as Moses, Abel as a shepherd, and the three youths thrown into the fiery furnace (Daniel 3)


Green News

An award winning TV botanist was sent a photo by his mother of the presentation and he knew he had to go public. Apparently all parts of the daffodil contain lycorinea toxic alkaloid that causes vomiting and diarrhoea and lycorine is easily spread through the body.

Even so the daffodil has been used in medicine as a purgative and as treatment for burns and wounds. The substance called galantamine has been extracted from the plant and is used to treat early stages of Alzheimer's dementia.

Gladys remembered

5th December 1927 -7th February 2024



Everybody who ever knew her will always remember Gladys! (*pictured above on her 90th Birthday*)

She never changed throughout her long life – she was immensely kind – good hearted – hard working – loyal and always cheerful. She had a good eye, always dressed in co-ordinating colours with a neat and attractive home.

My husband, Gerry, first met Gladys during the 1940's, at St. Mary's Youth Club better known at the time as the AYPA (*Anglican Young Peoples Association*) together with other names from the past – Don Hardy, John Morris (*Gags*), the Scull sisters and 'Wiggy' Willis (*Mary Pegrum*) to name but a few. It was an active, involved group and one of the highlights was taking part in a production of "Murder in the Cathedral" in the Church. This was supervised/produced by Fathe Degwell Thomas (*Digger*) the Curate at the time, who also played Becket.

Gladys first met Jack Powell at St John's, they married, lived in Entry Hill for many years and had one son, David. Later she had two grandchildren, with Robert being the one she related to best. However, it is from her days in Entry Hill that Molly first remembers Gladys as she always went to Evensong at St Andrew's, Combe Down where Molly played the piano for the Service. She was an active member of The Young Wives then later The Mothers' Union, both based at St Mary's, whilst in Father Jennings time she was the regular babysitter for his son, David, now Bishop David Jennings. In more recent times however, none of us will ever forget that Gladys never learnt to manage her hearing aids!!

She will be best and always remembered for flowers with her name, Gladys Lilian Rose, being a wonderful reflection of her life-long love and passion.

It was sometime during the 1970's when she took over the supervision of the

flowers at St Mary's Church – something she continued to do until approximately 2012. She had a wonderful team of willing helpers and one of her many highlights was the Flower Festival in St Mary's during the 1980's. At Easter she picked wild primroses to place all round the pulpit before it was forbidden to do so, and one year she masterminded many Christmas trees in the Nave for Father David - as she told me at great length.

Even though her funeral took place during Lent there were some flowers for Gladys. May She Rest in Peace.


