

LETTER FROM OUR PARISH PRIEST, FR PETER EDWARDS

Dear brothers and sisters

As we begin February, so we celebrate the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, the feast known as Candlemas. The gospel reading for that festival (Luke 2:22-40) features the words and actions of the faithful Simeon and Anna in the Temple, and Simeon's words to Mary, 'a sword shall pierce your own soul too.' So Candlemas looks back 40 days to the birth of the Lord at Christmas, and at the same time forward to the events of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection that we celebrate in Holy Week.

On Wednesday 18th February, Ash Wednesday, the Church begins that formal time of preparation for Holy Week and Easter that we call Lent. It is a time that calls us to renewal, to spiritual refreshment, a precious gift for Christians to seek a deeper relationship with the Lord. One of the ways in which we do this is through our lives of prayer, and +Michael Bath & Wells has asked everyone in the Diocese to have a special focus on developing and renewing our lives of prayer in 2026.

To support +Michael's call, all are invited to attend our Lent study group on Thursday evenings at The Rectory (26th Feb onwards at 7.30pm) when we will be invited to reflect more closely on The Lord's Prayer, that model of prayer that Jesus has given us and which can so easily become something that we take for granted. All members of our congregations will be invited to take a copy of Archbishop Stephen Cottrell's booklet on The Lord's Prayer—and whether or not you are able to attend our discussion group in person, please do take some time during these weeks of Lent to reflect on the different petitions that the prayer contains—the booklet has the subtitle 'Ten great lessons and one great hope.'



Other opportunities in Lent include attending the meditation on the passion of the Lord known as the Stations of the Cross—to be held every Thursday (19th Feb onwards) at 10am at St John's, and every Friday (20th Feb onwards) at 10am at St Mary's.

This performance will start with an introduction to our new Artistic Director, Adrian Brendel, followed by a discussion about tonight's performance with Solomon's Knot Artistic Director, Jonathan Sells and the writer/director of this evening's performance, Federay Holmes.

A fascinating programme of discovery and connection. George Jeffreys (c.1610-1685) lived between the great composers William Byrd and Henry Purcell, navigating the upheavals of the English Civil War. Organist to Charles I, he immersed himself in Italian madrigals, blending their expressiveness with Anglican intensity. His contemporary William Lawes can lay a claim to writing the earliest known chamber music, profoundly influencing the next generations of composers, including Purcell himself, through his bold and elaborate style.

Violinists **Stephen Waarts** and **Tim Crawford** are memorable past visitors to Bath Mozartfest while also specialising in Bach's music; the young Berlin-based violist **Noga Shaham** has made a fantastic



impression at the start of her career and has played regularly this season with leading orchestras including Berliner Philharmoniker; **Sergio Bucheli** and **Xiaowen Shang** are both in great demand as continuo players and they recently appeared together in a Nash Ensemble concert at London's Wigmore Hall. The opening performance by this year's resident festival ensemble is bookended by Bach's great contemporary, Handel. 

They receive non-judgemental kindness, support, friendship and advice, to help them continue their lives in calm surroundings and plan for their future. As Christians we pray for the staff, the women and their children at this critical time for them, when they need it most, and offer small financial assistance in this crucial work.

ST MARY'S CHARITY FOR FEBRUARY

ST MARY'S CHURCH make weekly collections during the Sunday services using the "Alms" envelopes which are given away to a different charity each month. On the Sundays in February, we will be supporting **Lux Youth Project**.

Those of us who enjoyed the delicious Charity Parish Breakfast in January were also able to hear first hand from the CEO of LUX, Luke Brightwell, about the vital work of this local charity. There are three ways that the charity works with young people – mentoring, youth clubs and Motus Dance Academy, and Christian Faith exploration. School mentoring is carried out in 7 secondary schools and one primary school, and members of the LUX team support children and young people facing a number of challenges from anxiety and panic attacks to family breakdown and risky behaviours. The charity runs four youth clubs across Bath and the dance academy. The charity also has specific groups for young people to explore the Christian faith. These are safe spaces for them to ask questions and discuss their beliefs and views. Last year the charity worked with 392 individual young people and 100% felt a positive impact from being mentored. 815 hours of youth work were delivered and 358 hours of faith exploration.

After our Christmas break we restart our series of Travel Lectures exploring Queensland, beginning at 7:30 pm **Monday 23rd February in St Mary's Hall: Riding North Queensland's iconic Outback trains, The Savannahlander.** This exciting journey takes us from the former goldmining town of Forsyth down to Cairns. On the way we will discover the long hidden beautiful Cobbold Gorge as well as exploring the famous, and truly amazing Undara Lava Tubes, before heading down past the spectacular Barron Falls. The journey includes several "hair-raising" river crossings on what seem extremely fragile trestle bridges! This is definitely an experience all you train buffs out there shouldn't miss. If trains are not really your thing, "no worries" as they say in Australia because not only will we be discovering some truly wild and remote Outback country but also meeting some amazing wildlife including seeing Australia's heaviest flying bird, The Australian Bustard, actually fly -a very rare sight. Ash Wednesday - 18th February

The twinkling lights of Christmas have been put away but there already signs of spring in the garden as snowdrops bloom and bulbs begin to show their heads. We look forward to remembering St Mary's Dedication with a Bring and Share Lunch, but what comes after that – it has to be Ash Wednesday.



What is the story behind Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday begins the 40 days of Lent, a time when we remember that Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness, fasting and resisting temptation. The day before Ash Wednesday, known as "Shrove Tuesday" or "Pancake Day", is a chance to feast, indulge and maybe even eat a pancake or two. We do this in preparation for our own fasting on Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent.

Is Ash Wednesday in the Bible?

Although Ash Wednesday is rich in Christian symbolism, you won't find it mentioned in the Bible. The tradition developed over time, starting with the first Council of Nicaea in 356AD under Emperor Constantine. It established a 40-day fasting period before Easter, but the practice of placing ashes on the heads of the congregation only began sometime between the 8th and 10th century. This was done to replace other practices of public penance which were no longer used, and to symbolize the beginning of the penitential season of Lent.

Why are the forehead and heart touched?

The touching of foreheads is an ancient greeting that honors the heart and the soul with the ashes symbolizing our mortality –

"Remember you are but dust, and to dust you shall return."


Where do the ashes for Ash Wednesday come from?

The Ash Wednesday ashes are usually, created by burning palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. Palm Sunday is the last Sunday of Lent and leads into Holy Week and as the palms have been blessed, instead of throwing them away after the celebration, they are saved to create ashes for Ash Wednesday.



Ash Wednesday is important because it marks the start of Lent, the weeks leading up to Easter, when Jesus died and was resurrected. The ashes symbolize death and repentance, so it is during Lent that Christians repent and mourn for their sins, because they know Christ died for them.




